Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ

I have never read an article about the transatlantic slave trade like the one in the February 2011 issue of *Civil War Times*. The article is entitled, "Hell on the Water," and it is written by Ron Soodalter. February is Black History Month in our nation; therefore, I will be devoting my articles in *The Gatepost* to this blemish on our nation's soul by referencing this moving article.

Mr. Soodalter wrote (p.50), "A slave ship generally carried large quantities of cures and disinfectants. Since such vessels rarely included a doctor in the crew, the captain of necessity became familiar with a wide range of nostrums and folk remedies – not out of humanitarianism, but to ensure the loss of as few slaves as possible. Some slave traders actually went as far to write their own medical manuals. To fight disease on board (most commonly smallpox), some captains smoked their vessels in pitch, which was believed to be a preventative. The combined stink of pitch, sweat and the human waste of captives wafting on the breeze made a slave ship a floating offense to the olfactory system. It was said that a slaver could be detected on the water several miles downwind, long before it was sighted. Sir Dalby Thomas, commander of England's Royal Africa Company, did not exaggerate when he pointed out in 1706: 'Your captains and mates must neither have dainty fingers or dainty noses, few men are fit for these voyages but them that are bred for it. It's a filthy voyage and a laborious [one]." Soodalter continued, "Sometimes the captain was a partial owner of the vessel or an investor in the voyage; sometimes he simply worked for a salary and a percentage of the sale price of the slaves at auction. He saw his job as merely to convey merchandise of a highly valuable and highly perishable nature to a viable market. He was in the transport business."

One of the reasons why I am drawing attention to this atrocious "trade" is because slavery still exists in the world today. May God help us for all human life is sacred; and we were all fearfully and wonderfully made. Pray for repentance and salvation for the perpetrators and comfort and rescue for the captives that this particular evil be permanently eradicated from our world.

I look forward to worshipping with you in church and growing with you in Sunday School.
