Thoughts from our Pastor

I miss my church family!! I can't wait to come back together, but I don't want to go back to where we were. I want better. I want to be stronger. I want to be more effective. I want to be more surrendered to Christ. And I'm not alone!

From what I hear, nearly every Christian says the same thing. But how we will be after the coronavirus has settled down largely depends upon what we do now. Now is the time to break some bad habits and start some new, healthy ones. In fact, "Time" is the key word. Most of us have more free time than we've had in a long while. The question is, "What are we doing with it?"

Some of us are facing some giants in our lives. Some of us were even before this virus hit us. Giants come in all shapes and sizes, but the point is the same, they seem insurmountable. And while, "The giant may be bigger than us, but it is not bigger than God" is true, there are some things we can do to contribute to success over the giants in our lives.

Did you know that the average American spends about three hours a day watching television? Instead, we can use some of that time to invest in our relationship with Jesus Christ. We can read the Bible more. We can read through the Gospel of John in about two hours. As a matter of fact, if we could read without interruption, we can read through the Old Testament in about 60 hours and the New Testament in about 20 hours. At noon, he looked over and again, his opponent was taking another break. The big guy thought to himself, "This is going to be like taking candy from a baby." But he wasn't going to let up. He kept chopping. At 3:00 pm, the smaller guy was taking his third break of the day.

Worshiping in Spirit "or" Truth

In John 4:24, Jesus makes the statement, "God is spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth". Oddly, it seems many in today's church, have taken out the word "and" and replaced it with the word "or".

Sam Storms is the "Lead pastor for preaching and vision" at Bridgeway Church in Oklahoma City. In an article written for the Gospel Coalition, Rev. Storms says our worship is not meant to be formed by what feels good, but by the light of what's true. Some prefer to worship only "in spirit" but couldn't care less about truth. In fact, they think focusing on truth has the potential to quench the Spirit. The standard by which they judge the success of worship is the thrills and chills they experience.

Conversely, he says others prefer to worship only "in truth" and are actually offended when they or others feel anything or experience heightened emotions. He knows of a pastor who wishes his church didn't have music, because he felt the emotions stirred by music cause distractions that take away from the message.

The correct response, of course, is that "those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth". Rev. Storms cites John Piper, who says it this way:

"Truth without emotion produces dead orthodoxy and a church full of artificial admirers. On the other hand, emotion without truth produces empty frenzy and cultivates shallow people who refuse the discipline of rigorous thought. But true worship comes from people who are deeply emotional and who love deep and sound doctrine. Strong affections for God rooted in truth are the bone and marrow of biblical worship."

Rev. Storms concludes by talking about his own church: "Some will say we're too experiential in our worship, others contend we're too theological, but I don't think you can be too much of either, as long as both are embraced, and God is honored.

None of this means you have to worship the way other people at your church do. If the truth of God's Word moves you to lift your hands, dance, or shout aloud, God bless you. If the truth of God's Word leads you into solemn reverence, as you remain seated and immovable, God bless you.

But let's make certain that in either case we are worshiping in both spirit and truth. For it is just such people the Father is seeking."

And all God's people said, Amen!



Prayer matters and prayer works. It just does. In Mark 11:24 Jesus said "Therefore I tell you, whatever you ask in prayer, believe that you have received it, and it will be yours." Over the past two months we have held two separate 24 hour

prayer emphases, and both times God has faithfully responded to the prayer of His people in many different ways. Knowing that God works through prayer, and knowing that we are commanded to "pray without ceasing" (1 Thessalonians 5:17) we feel led to continue to plan a 24 hour prayer emphasis monthly. - Our obedience to the Lord here at Northgate
- Our love for one another here at Northgate
- Lastly we will also pray not only for healing during the pandemic, but also that God would work through the circumstances surrounding Covid-19
