



## **Thoughts from our Pastor**

We are truly living in unprecedented times. No one has seen America like this before. Even during the American Civil War, there were large pockets of our nation that were untouched by the war. That is not the case today. All fifty states have been affected and negatively impacted by the coronavirus, racism, and civil unrest. Our nation is divided. Not since the Civil War have we seen our nation this divided. If one were to spend two hours watching Fox News and then two hours watching CNN, they would see two opposing worldviews – and that is from a secular point of view!

Covid-19 has had a devastating impact upon the church (not just Northgate). Early in the pandemic (March and April 2020) online worship was going well and seemed to be filling the need for our spiritual appetites. However, as the year has progressed and as we have entered the summer, attendance has steadily declined in online viewing and certainly in congregational worship (due to Covid-19 precautions and concerns). Lower church attendance, over time, erodes interest. Even when we can come together, because of social distancing and face masks, fellowship suffers. We are unable to have in person Wednesday services, Sunday School or traditional Summer Vacation Bible School because of Covid-19 concerns and precautions.

Therefore, it is more important than ever that our personal devotional life is healthy and strong. It is important that we remain disciplined to daily Bible reading and having an active prayer life. It is important that we find ways to actively share our faith. It is important that we take advantage of and support our monthly telephone prayer emphases. These monthly prayer emphases are not only beneficial in the obvious time of uninterrupted prayer, but also for purposes of fellowship. They provide an avenue for us to pray with one another on the telephone. Continuing tithes and offerings are also important. Not only do they help us to connect to the fellowship of the church, they provide a concrete means of active faith.

At a time when our nation desperately needs a strong church, the church is weakened by Covid-19. Covid-19 affected our land like a plague and weakened us at our core. Even before the Covid-19 shut-down, regular church attendance by professing American Christians was in decline. We are in desperate need for revival!

So, as I did last month, I urge you to seek personal revival:

2 Chronicles 7:14 – "If My people who are called by My name will humble themselves, and pray and seek My face, and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land."

In the New Covenant, 'My people who are called by My name," is the church. So, let's humble ourselves, pray and seek God first. Let's confess our personal, church, national and international sin to the Lord and repent from our wicked ways. And let's expect God to hear us and forgive us and heal us. Let's seek revival and awakening and expect that God will bring it.

#### A Message from Dennis Page, Worship Leader

The Power of God's Music—"There's Something About That Name." In the early '70's, Bill and Gloria Gaither were pioneers in what we now might call Contemporary Christian music. They wrote songs that were doctrinally sound, while at the same time being wonderfully singable with beautiful

melodies. These songs not only touched the singers' heart but enabled the singer to touch the heart of God.

The Gaither's authored a number of great songs, a dozen of which appear in our Baptist Hymnal. Perhaps their song you are most familiar with is "Because he Lives". But that's not the song that's most special to me. That honor goes to "There's Something About That Name."

Let me tell you a story. When our kids were very little, every night when it was the kids' bedtime, Peggy would stand by their crib. and later as they got older, would sit on the bed beside them. She would lovingly stroke them while singing "There's Something About That Name."

Our precious children grew up knowing the Lord's love and their mother's love. But as they always do, our children grew up and then had children of their own.

Fast forward to 2012, I started having headaches, weird headaches. They would last only for a moment, but were sharp, stabbing pains that would come out of the blue, and could occur anywhere in my head. I went to doctor after doctor trying to find out what was going on, all to no avail. Then one night, as I'm lying in bed, I hear the whooshing sound of blood pulsing behind my ear. After consulting with more doctors, it was determined I had an Arteriovenous Malformation (an AVM). This is a potentially dangerous condition. The neurosurgeon elected to do arteriogram, where a probe was run up through my groin, and into the brain to make the repair. Sometime after I was released from the physician's care, I started having what are called partial complex seizures. These episodes are not seizures in the traditional sense. No one could look at me, and tell I was having one, but I certainly could. When I was having one, my world became dark and nightmarish. It was difficult to grasp reality.

So, I found myself back in the hospital, having a series of these episodes, fighting for reality. It was in the midst of one of these seizure episodes and my adult son comes over, begins stroking me, and singing those precious words:

> Jesus, Jesus, Jesus, there's just something about that Name. Master, Savior, Jesus, like the fragrance after the rain. Jesus, Jesus, Jesus, let all heaven and earth proclaim. Kings and Kingdom's will all pass away, but there's something about that Name.

Peace filled my heart, and soothed my body, and I began to see daylight again, and although I would require additional surgery, I knew the worst was over. Talking about this is quite emotional for me, but now, as I think about it, sweetness is no small part of that emotion. Truly, there's something about that name.

In Luke 18:1-8, Jesus spoke a parable to His disciples that communicates the power of persistent prayer. " <sup>6</sup>Then the Lord said, "Hear what the unjust judge said. <sup>7</sup>And shall God not avenge His own elect who cry out day and night to Him, though He bears long with them? 8I tell you that He will avenge them speedily. Nevertheless, when the Son of Man comes, will He really find faith on the earth?" Let's be like that persistent widow. Let's pray like our lives depend upon it because they do.
