

## **Thoughts from our Pastor**

In our study through Ephesians, we have come to Paul's famous section on submission. In Ephesians 5:21, Paul wrote that we are to submit to one another in the fear of God. I reckon nearly every married person has heard something about submission from Ephesians 5:22-33. In Ephesians 6, Paul wrote that children are to obey their parents and that slaves are to obey their masters. The theme of Ephesians 5:21-6:9 is submission.

During one of my recent morning devotions, I read chapters 9 and 10 from the book of Acts. In that passage, Saul was converted to Paul on the road to Damascus by the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ. At the moment of his conversion experience, Paul asked Jesus (Acts 9:6), "Lord, what do You want me to do?" Wow! What a question!! That was not only a question for Paul, but a question for all Christians: "Lord, what do you want me to do?" Then, Acts 9:11 caught my attention: "So the Lord said to him [Ananias], "Arise and go to the street called Straight, and inquire at the house of Judas for one called Saul of Tarsus, for behold, he is praying."

Judas (whoever he was) had a key role in Paul's ministry. He was housing the hunter who would now become the hunted. Saul was going to Damascus to arrest Christians and along the way, it was he who was arrested and Saul surrendered to the Lord and became Paul. In just the first few days after Paul's conversion, God used Ananias, Judas and who knows who else to minister to the dreaded Saul who God had changed to His servant Paul. And each had to ask the question that Paul asked the Lord Jesus – "Lord what do You want me to do?" And each had to submit their trust to God and to one another in order to be used of God.

God had a plan when He arrested Saul on the Damascus Road; a plan that no human knew and a plan that would change the world. For Christians to be used in God's plan then and now, submission is required. Christian submission has two main components: love and trust. For us to become involved in God's work around us, we must submit our way to God's way and submit to one another in the fear of God.

Paul had to trust Judas and Judas had to trust Paul and Ananias had to trust both and both had to trust Ananias and everyone had to trust the Lord!!! That has not changed. It is the reason we refer to one another as brothers and sisters in Christ. When someone comes to faith in Christ, they become a child of God (John 1:12) and therefore a brother and sister of other Christians (Galatians 3:26).

One of the blessings of a healthy family relationship is that we love and trust each other, to the point of submission. In any family, there are times of conflict and disagreement and to overcome that conflict there must be submission. It is no different in the church. We are family. Because we love and trust one another, we can submit to one another in the fear (respect) of God. That leaves no room for gossip or malice; only love and trust. God has called us to be like Judas and Ananias. God has a plan and for us to be a part of it, we must trust Him as well as one another.

Over the past handful of weeks our staff has been reading through 2 Timothy together. We couldn't help but to notice how much of what we are reading seems to be so applicable in today's world (it's funny how that happens isn't it?) 2 Timothy 2:16-17 says "But avoid worldly and empty chatter, for it will lead to further ungodliness, and their talk will spread like gangrene" (NASB). It really is amazing the impact of words isn't it? Nations have gone to war over words and nations have come to peace over words. Words have changed the course of history time and time again. This is why we must be careful with our words. Paul talks about how worldly and ungodly chatter can spread. Sound familiar? If not, just turn on the news or even better your Facebook feed. More than ever everybody has a voice and hate, vitriol, and ungodliness has spread at an alarming rate as a result.

Now you maybe thinking, "yea the world's gone crazy lately, at least I'm not like them." That may be so (depending on who "them" is) but remember that Paul is talking to believers. So let's turn things back on ourselves for a minute. How is my chatter? Let me ask it this way. What is the result of the things that I focus my words and attention on on a daily basis? Do my words result in divisiveness? Am I finding myself always speaking in anger or hate? How about the positive side? Are my words leading people into a closer relationship with Jesus? Are my words leading the lost from death in sin to new life in Christ? What impact do our words have on the spread of the gospel?

As a Student Minister, I also have to mention that our young people are watching. They are watching you and watching me. They are watching the words I use and how I use them. Whether we realize it or not these young people are forming their views of Christians and what it means to be a Christian by watching and listening to us. What impact are your words leaving on the next generation? Are you leading these students into a deeper relationship with Jesus with your words, or are you pushing them further away?

Some of you know that our son, Chris, directs Agape Children's Ministry in Kisumu, Kenya. He and his wife, Tammy, have served as missionaries there for 9 years. Two of their six children were born in Kenya.

Chris and his family had tickets to fly back to the U.S. in April for a planned furlough. Then Covid-19 struck. Needless to say, they're still in Kenya.

A little about Agape's ministry. Agape rescues kids off the street. Rather than placing kids into an orphanage, Agape's model is to Rescue, Rehabilitate, Redeem, and Reintegrate these kids with their families. Agape's success has been remarkable. Over the last 10 years Agape has reintegrated more than 3000 kids with their families

#### So, from Kisumu, Kenya, here's our son's article regarding our response to COVID-19:

With Covid-19, it seems like the world is stuck in neutral. Agape hasn't been allowed to rehabilitate children on our campuses for over three months. Visits to our reintegrated families have been seriously limited due to the risks of using public vehicles. Our family's trip back to the U.S. to put Sutton into college has been postponed to ... who knows when? Seth was supposed to celebrate his birthday in the U.S. for the first time in 10 years. Connor was supposed to go to boarding school for her senior year of high school in August. International travel bans, second waves, curfews, spiking positivity percentages, city blockades, waiting to reach the top of "the curve" - it seems like the world is spinning its wheels!

But then I'm reminded that Jesus said in John 16 that I am not of this world. Jesus chose me out of this world. And because I belong to Jesus, I am to grow . . . even in times when everything else seems to be on hold. Thankfully, I'm not doing this alone -God grows his children. Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 3:18, "And we all, with unveiled faces, beholding the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another. For this comes from the Lord who is the Spirit." Scripture likewise indicates our part in our personal growth, as well. Paul later writes in Philippians 3:12 and 14, "I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own ... I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus". I love how Peter closes out his second Epistle: "Grow in the grace and the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. To Him be the glory both now and to the day of eternity." While the world is in a rut, let's grow in the grace and the knowledge of Jesus Christ! And all God's people said, Amen!
