



Thoughts from our Pastor

Northgate is beginning to take baby steps to open up to more services and ministries while being careful to respect one another's health through social distancing and good hygiene. Since last March, when the Covid shutdown began, Northgate has tried to be good stewards of the times. We realize we have a responsibility to provide a place to worship, fellowship and serve that is as safe as possible. While it is impossible to eliminate every possibility of virus exposure, we have earnestly tried to do our best.

One decision we made very early was to make wearing masks at Northgate voluntary. While I stand by that decision, I've also learned that making masks optional places much more importance upon social distancing. We should remain at least six feet apart from one another – especially if we make the decision not to wear a mask. As we return to more services and ministries it is more important than ever to be respectful of one another's decisions regarding the seriousness and the contagiousness of the virus. Just this week, in my little circle of friends and acquaintances, I have received news that five additional friends or friends of friends have tested positive for Covid. Sadly, two have died from the virus.

Personally, I choose to wear a mask when I am around groups of people simply as a measure of courtesy and prevention. I will gladly give up my right (not to wear a mask) for their peace of mind. Further, I do not want to be responsible for inadvertently spreading the virus to someone who can not tolerate it. However, I continue to shop in stores, worship in church and fellowship with family and friends. I am not controlled by fear (2 Timothy 1:7), but I am respectful of others and I respect their convictions concerning the virus. One thing I've learned is that it is a very minor inconvenience for me to wear a mask while at the grocery store or attending church.

One of the sad realities of this pandemic is that it has led to division in churches. Precisely at the time when our nation desperately needs a united church presenting the hope of the gospel, we are divided over the issue of our right as Americans to wear or not wear a mask. This is truly a sad reality. We are placing undo value on a temporal matter possibly at the expense of eternity. Our focus must always be on the gospel first. We seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and trust in Him to provide for our temporal needs. Upon hearing the news of the death of United States Supreme Court Associate Justice Ruth Ginsburg, my immediate thought was not, "Who will replace her on the court?" My immediate thought was, "She is in eternity. I hope she knew the Lord Jesus Christ as her Savior."

God gave guidance long ago through the writing of the Apostle Paul:

I am not anyone's slave. But I have become a slave to everyone, so that I can win as many people as possible. ²⁰When I am with the Jews, I live like a Jew to win Jews. They are ruled by the Law of Moses, and I am not. But I live by the Law to win them. ²¹And when I am with people who are not ruled by the Law, I forget about the Law to win them. Of course, I never really forget about the law of God. In fact, I am ruled by the law of Christ. ²²When I am with people whose faith is weak, I live as they do to win them. I do everything I can to win everyone I possibly can. ²³I do all this for the good news, because I want to share in its blessings. (1 Corinthians 9:19-23, CEV).

The truth is that when we're uncomfortable we better realize our utter dependency on God. We're reminded of the words of Paul when he tells us that "God's power is perfected in our weakness." I feel that maybe this very uncomfortable time that many of us are going through is just the kick in the pants that we need as believers. A Message from Dennis Page, Worship Leader

No blood, no broken bones, not terribly sore! Pretty amazing for a guy, who just Thursday was driving a vehicle, that was struck by another car on Rutherford Rd. and completely flipped (talk about taking a car out for a spin.) My son's SUV was totaled, but I was spared. There is a connection with the incident, and this month's Gate Post article. *Read on*.

Psalms is the book in the Bible most often equated with worship. Similarly, when we think about our practical wisdom and advice. Proverbs is our go-to book. Well, today is your lucky day! I'm going to introduce you to a secret, fun plan that will help you get a handle on both Psalms and Proverbs. Follow it, and it will change your life. It did mine.

Here's my plan: Read one Psalm per day, consecutively for 30 days each month based the date. e.g.: Jan 1st = Psalm 1, Feb. 12th = Psalm 42 (30+ 12), April 10th Psalm 100 (90+10), and so on. On months with 31 days, the 31st is a free day (only 30 Psalms per month, no more, no less). On May 30th you will have read all 150 Psalms. On June 1st begin with Proverbs 1. On July 1st repeat the process and you will read through Psalms and Proverbs twice a year.

Now for the practical application. On Thursday, October 1st we will be reading **Psalm 91.** That Psalm has always been special to me, but even more so, in light of my accident. Here's how it begins:

1 He who dwells in the shelter of the Most High will abide in the shadow of the almighty. 2 I will say to the Lord, "My refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust." 3 For he will deliver you from the snare of the fowler and from the deadly pestilence. 4 He will cover you with his pinions, and under his wings you will find refuge --- and that's just the beginning! You'll definitely want to hang out in Psalm 91.

The Psalms are life changers, and I urge you to spend time in them. I promise, you'll be blessed. BTW, although I've made Psalm 91 my own Psalm, I'm willing to share. *In Him Who first loved us, Dennis*


