My first car had bench seats, with a V8 under the hood, an automatic transmission with the shifter on the column. When I first started



driving, there were many who said they would never wear a seat belt. Here was their faulty logic: "I'd rather be thrown out of the car than be trapped inside by a seat belt." To be honest, as a teenager, I fell into that kind of thinking.

When I was in high school, drivers education classes were taught at every high school. Since we got our driver's permit when we were fifteen (on our fifteenth birthday!), most students took the driver's education class during their sophomore or junior year. In addition to watching horrible films of car wrecks and learning how to pass the driver's license test, a state trooper always made a visit to the class for a little shock and awe. The state trooper that visited my class changed my thinking about seat belts. He asked a simple question, "Why do you think cars have seat belts?" Our answers were, of course, to keep us from flying through the windshield in case of an accident! But he challenged that thinking. He said:


