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

## **Thoughts from our Pastor**

Thanksgiving is much more than an American holiday. It is a biblical response to the greatness of God. We see a great example of this truth in the Book of Revelation:

And the twenty-four elders who sat before God on their thrones fell on their faces and worshiped God, <sup>17</sup>saying: "We give You thanks, O Lord God Almighty, the One who is and who was and who is to come, because You have taken Your great power and reigned. <sup>18</sup>The nations were angry, and Your wrath has come, and the time of the dead, that they should be judged, and that You should reward Your servants the prophets and the saints, and those who fear Your name, small and great, and should destroy those who destroy the earth." (Revelation 11:16-18, NKJV).

Why were the twenty-four elders giving thanks to the Lord? When we read this passage in the context of the chapter, we find they were giving thanks for the Lord's justice. And as far as we know, at this moment and forevermore, they will be giving thanks for God's justice. Of course, thanksgiving is found in many places and for many reasons in the Bible prior to the Book of Revelation. In fact, the phrase, "Oh give thanks to the Lord for He is good; for His steadfast love endures forever" occurs (with some minor variation) eighty-one times in the Bible!! Giving thanks to the Lord is nothing new and is certainly no small matter.

We see it in our own lives. We give thanks for the small as well as the great. When the server at the restaurant fills our glass of water, we typically say, "Thank you." When the surgeon successfully finishes his work and gives a report on our loved one's health, "Thank you," is our typical response. In the simplest of terms, thanksgiving is a response.

However, thanksgiving is more than a response, it is an attitude. For Christians, thanksgiving and worship are joined at the hip. As we grow in Christ and realize that His steadfast love endures forever, thanksgiving moves from a response to an attitude and finally to worship. The Book of Job tells us that Job was the greatest man in the east, yet he lost everything near and dear to him – even the lives of his children. His response reflected his attitude and his worship toward the Lord:

Then Job arose, tore his robe, and shaved his head; and he fell to the ground and worshiped. <sup>21</sup>And he said: "Naked I came from my mother's womb, and naked shall I return there. The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; Blessed be the name of the Lord." <sup>22</sup>In all this Job did not sin nor charge God with wrong. (Job 1:20-22, NKJV).

When we gather with family and friends around the Thanksgiving table, let's remember that thanksgiving is a response that grows into an attitude that leads to worship. Thanksgiving really has nothing to do with circumstances and everything to do with the steadfast love of God through His Son – our Savior – Jesus Christ.

Some years ago I was working with a college student whose entire family were not believers. She would constantly ask for prayer for her family to come to faith in Jesus. One day her high school aged sister was visiting her on campus. #### A Message from Dennis Page, Worship Leader

The Hymn "Just as I Am" is the best-known invitation hymn in all of Christendom. Here's how it came to be.

Following an illness in her early 30's, the hymn's author, Charlotte Elliott (1789-1871), of Brighton England became a bitter invalid, declaring "If God loved me, He would not have treated me this way". Charlotte's brother, a pastor, in hopes of encouraging his sister, invited a Swiss minister, Dr. Cesar Malan, to be their family dinner guest. Perceiving Charlotte's mindset, Dr. Malan said "You're holding onto your hate and anger, because you have nothing else in the world cling to." Charlotte said, "What is your cure?" Dr. Malan responded, "You would give yourself to God just as you are now, with your fighting's and fears, hates and loves, pride and shame." Charlotte said "I would come to God just as I am. Is that right?"

Soon after Charlotte responded to Christ, her poem "Just as I Am" was published in the "Invalid's Hymnbook". This "sweet hymn" then found its way into magazines and other publications, into religious circles, then into hymnbooks. Sometime after its publication, a lady, struck by its beauty, printed it in leaflet form where it was widely circulated in cities and towns throughout England. In modern times, it has become associated with Billy Graham Crusades, where hundreds of thousands of people have responded to its melody and message.

The impact of even the infirmed, yielded to God, is never to be underestimated.
